

The liturgies of Christmas as set out in the sacramentary and lectionary seek to express and shape the spirituality not of one person or of a single cultural community but of the entire ecclesial bodies of those baptized into the pasch of Jesus Christ. They set before us the powerful challenge of the Christmas child who is not our personal or communal past but the dawning future we share with all humanity. Advent has prepared us for the child of the Christmas texts (2011 Ordo).

Next to the yearly celebration of the paschal mystery, the Church holds most sacred the memorial of Christ's birth and early manifestations. This is the purpose of the Christmas season (General Norms, 32).

A Sense of the Season

Advent is the way we as church express our hopes. Prophetic visions, prayers and songs calling for the Lord to come do help us to hope profoundly. Advent allows us to do what most others do in December but to see in the coming Lord the answer to our dreams. In our Catholic tradition, keeping Advent means singing the songs of expectation, of our hopes and longing, before we enter into the full-throated praise of Christmas carols.

Here are a few lines from our tradition on what Advent is about. "Advent has a twofold character: as a season to prepare us for Christmas when Christ's first coming is remembered; as a season when that remembrance directs the mind and the heart to await Christ's second coming at the end of time. Advent is thus a period for devout and joyful expectation." (General Norms for the Liturgical Year and the Calendar, #39)

Thomas Merton, in his book Seasons of Celebration, reviewed the ways Saint Bernard of Clairvaux approached these comings of Christ. The first advent was Christ's birth. The other will be at the end of time. Faith in these two stimulates recognition of a third, the advent of Christ in our church now, today. Viewed from this perspective, the Advent liturgy, with its scriptures, prayers and songs, is neither a romantic return to the Old Testament while we wait for the baby at Bethlehem, nor is it an exercise in expressing hope for an ever-receding end of time. The Advent liturgy is neither nostalgic nor illusory. When we take the tradition and enter it fully, we become Advent, the people in and through whom Christ comes.



At the Crossroads Padre Pio

Our pilgrimage dubbed as "Following the Footsteps of St. Paul" made a side visit to the crypt of Padre Pio in San Giovanni Rotondo in Southern Italy.

Padre Pio was born Francesco Forgione in May 25, 1887. He entered the Capuchin order at the age of 15, taking on the name of Bro. Pio. In 1910 Padre Pio was ordained priest.

It is said that as a young boy of 5 years, he already decided to dedicate his life to God and lived a life of penance, like having a stone for a pillow. He worked on the land and delayed his education. When he informed his parents of his desire to enter the Capuchin monastery, the parents were told that he was welcome but that he needed more education. So Padre Pio's father traveled to America, worked here in order to be able to send his son to school and fulfill his dream to become a member of the Capuchin order.

It is said that his health was fragile as a young priest. He lived in San Giovanni Rotondo for most of his priestly and religious life. He dedicated himself to the celebration of the Sacraments of Penance and Reconciliation and of the Holy Eucharist.

On 20 September 1918 it is said that he began to experience the Stigmata: the wounds of Jesus on the Cross, while experiencing divine ecstasy. For the next 50 years, Padre Pio's hands would be wrapped to hide the wounds and the blood that flowed. It is said that his sharing in the wounds of Jesus included his feet and his side.

He died in September 23, 1968 at the age of 81. Beatified in May 2, 1999, Padre Pio was canonized in June 16, 2002 by Pope John Paul II.

Here are some famous quotes from Padre Pio, for our spiritual nourishment.

"Pray, hope, and don't worry. Worry is useless. God is merciful and will hear your prayer."

"Prayer is the best weapon we have; it is the key to God's heart. You must speak to Jesus not only with your lips, but with your heart. In fact on certain occasions you should only speak to Him with your heart."

"The life of a Christian is nothing but a perpetual struggle against self; there is no flowering of the soul to the beauty of its perfection except at the price of pain."


HELP FOR THE HOMELESS AND HUNGRY

RISKY BUSINESS

Matthew's Gospel today tells us Joseph was betrothed to Mary. Unlike engagement, betrothal was a binding contract. The couple might wait for a year before beginning married life. Sexual activity during the betrothal was frowned upon. If the bride became pregnant by another man, her groom could denounce her, and she would be stoned to death. The alternative was quiet divorce. This would have saved Joseph from humiliation, but would have done nothing to protect Mary. God spoke in Joseph's dream and told him to take Mary as his wife. God named her child Jesus - the one who saves. Joseph took a risk and said "Yes" to God, without regard for the outcome.

Not all women have a "just man" like Joseph to stand by them during pregnancy and birth, or the resources to cope with single motherhood or a child with disabilities. Take a risk like Joseph and commit to offering help.
